Dear Parents,

Well done to everyone for making it to half term! I am sure that a number of you will be both happy and relieved that the pressures of home-schooling will temporarily cease (if only for a week!) From everyone at the school, our sincerest thanks for all of your care and support of the children's home learning over this extremely challenging half term. Thanks to your efforts, and the sterling work of the teachers and support staff, we feel hopeful that disruption to the children's learning has been minimised as much as is possible, considering the circumstances.

We really hope that the situation is deemed safe enough for us to be able to welcome all children back into the school shortly after half term. As you are aware, the date of 8th March has been prospectively pinned by the Prime Minister as a possible return date for primary schools, but as yet I am afraid that I do not have any further information to report on this. This could be a staggered opening for certain year groups, or it could be for all year groups – we simply do not know at the moment (hopefully the latter). We will keep you posted whenever we do receive any firm announcements – although if past occasions are anything to go by, you will probably be told at the same time as us anyway!

We hope that the children (and adults) enjoyed the screen-free day on Wednesday. The children have posted some lovely photos and messages about the things that they got up to on the day, and the few children who are still in school also enjoyed taking part in a number of creative, active and mindfulness-themed activities. There is an increasing body of research suggesting that the increased isolation and technology-based learning that has accompanied the lockdowns is having a significant effect on the wellbeing of lots of different people across society, and so we hope that days such as this provide the children with an opportunity to recharge and think about the other things that are important in life.

Aside from school, there are a lot of support agencies out there for families who are finding this time particularly difficult. I am attaching two information documents from our colleagues at Mind West Essex and Family Lives Essex. The lockdown has also triggered a number of families nationwide to become increasingly concerned about what their children are accessing online.
