 - Goes out of their way to help someone else.










Our School has entered the Bee Good Plot Competition!

Introduction

The Shang Dynasty was an advanced civilisation that flourished more than 3,500 years ago in China. They created beautiful objects in bronze, jade and ceramic.

Shang gods

The Shang Supreme god was called Shang Di. The Shang people also believed and worshipped lots of other spirits or lesser gods. Many of these were connected to the natural world and the Shang people believed the spirits were all around controlling different elements of nature. Some of the nature gods included a Sun god, a moon god and a rain god.

SHANG DYNASTY

Family and Ancestor Worship

In the Shang Dynasty, the most important thing was family. This is very similar to today's Chinese culture, as family is still very important to them. In fact, family was so important to the Shang Dynasty that they even believe that after death they still exist as real people: they speak them with good offerings, they talk to them and ask questions about the future with oracle bones and they attempt to please them with 'workshops' such as animal or human sacrifices.

The communication

The Shang would give/offer their ancestors different gifts and if they accepted them, then they would ask if they liked the gift using a cracked turtle shell or an ox scapula. If they liked it, then they would thrive. If not, then it was thought terrible and devastating things would happen.

Gods

The Shang Dynasty believed in many gods, including the gods of the wind, sun and moon. The supreme god was Shangdi, who was believed to rule not only people in the Shang Dynasty, but all the other gods praised him too.

CEREMONIES AND SACRIFICES OF THE SHANG DYNASTY!

We are travelling back in time to the 1600s Before Christ, to see what the Shang Dynasty did in ceremonies and sacrifices! Archaeologists have discovered many things about this and it is very interesting. If you intend to find me more, look further down the page and find out more.

Important Ceremonies Celebrated

Many religious ceremonies were held by the Shang. These were led by a priest or sometimes a king. In the ceremonies, offerings of wine or bronze objects might be made to the ancestors, as the people did not directly worship Shang Di himself.

Did you know?
Animals were normally used for sacrifices, but sometimes slaves or poor children were chosen!

Why Sacrifices were being done

The Shang made sacrifices to Di, the high lord, nature powers like the sun and moon, and spirits. They sacrificed to former lords, ancestors, and loyal wives who were ancestors of the present king. The Shang believed that their ancestors held power over them and performed rituals to get their approval for planned actions.
